A HISTORY OF WORDS

Christmas

According to the Catholic Encyclopedia, the word Christmas originates from the phrase "*Cristes Maesse*", first recorded in 1038, which means the Mass of Christ or Christ's Mass. The word mass is the English version of the Latin word missa, a celebration of the Eucharist, done in memory of Jesus Christ, where Christians eat bread and drink wine. But not all is Latin; in fact, the word Christ comes from the Greek word Khristos, translated from the Hebrew term messiah, which means anointed.

Festive

This word comes from the latin term for feast: *festivus*. It originally meant joyous, gay, and merry. It was also related to *festum*, which means holiday or festival.

Advent

Advent originates from the Latin *adventus*, a term meaning arrival or approach.

Nativity

Nativity comes from Latin, via French, referring to being born and birth.

Carol

The world carol was used in medieval times to refer to a dance carried out in circles, usually performed during pagan celebrations. It was a type of folk music that Christians later adapted to religious themes, thus becoming the Christmas carol we know today.

Christmas pudding

The English and Irish tradition of having plum pudding at Christmas was carried across the Atlantic and spread out in the "colonies." Some historians believe that Christmas pudding traditionally had thirteen ingredients, one for Christ and one for each of the Apostles.

Noah Webster defined plum pudding as "pudding containing raisins or currants." The word has meandered in history, eventually becoming associated with rich, sweet foods. Plum pudding is one of such sweet examples.

I saw raindrops on the river, Joy is like the rain. Bit by bit the river grows 'Til all at once it overflows. Joy is like the rain.



Albert Einstein once said, "God did not create evil. Just as darkness is the absence of light, evil is the absence of God."

So how do we measure or talk about concepts such as hope, joy, peace? Are these just positive attributes which are understood as the opposite of something else? Peace as a lack of violence? Joy versus sadness? Hope versus despair? There is a website that aims to create an annual Global Peace Index, with one of the key features being a country's levels of violence; a criterion that puts Iceland apparently at the top of the table (i.e. highest rating of peace), Afghanistan at the bottom and Australia sitting at #22.

It is challenging to consider what are the indicators of peace? What does peace look like, if we <u>don't</u> define it in terms of 'how many murders', or 'how many cases of domestic violence'.

Try making a list of the positive actions we could count to measure and describe peace.

Is Christmas relevant? by Clinton White

There must be billions of words that have been written about Christmas. But what does Christmas mean? Is it modern? Is it relevant to us anymore?

Some might say that it's too cold at Christmas to play golf. Others might lament that it's too hot to snuggle under a rug by the fire. Should we have a hot roast dinner or a cold meat salad? Should we go to Church and sing traditional Christmas carols or just use Christmas as some sort of excuse to pig-out?

People talk about Christmas being a time of giving, a time of sharing and loving our neighbour. We even stop shooting each other during war on Christmas Day ... only for one day, though! Is it all just talk, or is there really something about Christmas that is still meaningful to us after 2,000 years?

The origins of Christmas are well known. But the Bible doesn't talk much about it. Even two of the apostles don't mention the birth of Jesus. Mark starts with the baptism of Jesus by John. John starts with his first encounter with Jesus, declaring him the "Lamb of God". Matthew and Luke are the only reporters of that famous birth in Bethlehem.

People say that Christmas today is too commercial. We all party, shops advertise heavily, we decorate our houses, Santa is revered ... even feared by tiny tots ... reindeer abound.

Then, it's said to be too stressful. Tempers fray, spending goes into overdrive, we frantically prepare for the holiday at the coast, we wrestle others for that perfectly shaped Christmas tree, we frantically look for somewhere to agist the dog or the cat, we swoop on the supermarkets like a plague of locusts in a wheat field.

Well, maybe. But is it really all those things? Isn't it nice to walk into a shop and hear the sounds of Christmas - Silent Night, Away in a Manger, The First Nowell? Isn't it nice to see a Nativity scene tucked away in all the tinsel?

"For everything that was written in the past was written to teach us, so that through the endurance taught in the Scriptures and the encouragement they provide, we might have hope." Romans 15:4

HOPF

What keeps someone going, when they have been so severely burned in a fire that they are totally unrecogniseable (Turia Pitt), or to be born with a tumour wrapped around your spinal cord that is operated on but leaves you paralysed (Dylan Alcott)? In his book, Man's search for meaning, Viktor Frankl (a survivor of four concentration camps - including Auschwitz) commented that he watched many men in the concentration camps. His observations led him to understand that those who had a deep spiritual belief had hope, and therefore survived the horrendous conditions inside the camps. Those that didn't have hope, quickly declined and inevitably died.

A quote I read when thinking about hope says, "Someday all you will have to light your way will be a single ray of hope and that will be enough" (Kobi Yamada). While I agree with the sentiment, that having hope in your life will often get you through, I like to think that the greatest difference in taking a Christian perspective is that it is not turned inwards to the self, but outwards. And so I rephrase Kobi's words to say: "Someday, all someone will have to light their way will be you, as a single ray of hope in their lives, and you will be enough." Just as having God in our lives is 'enough' for us.

What a beautiful, simple word - "joy". There is no complication about joy; it just is. I tried looking for a poem about joy on the web, and couldn't find anything that captured the simplicity of its uplifting spirit. The poems I glanced at, looked at the sense of 'joy' by contrasting this state to sadness.
